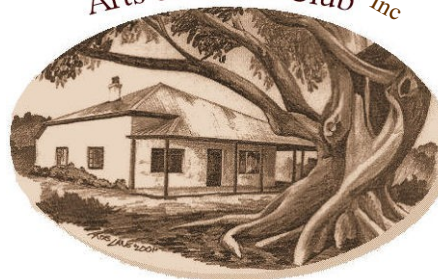

WHEELCHAIRS FOR KIDS

Last week I had the opportunity to visit the Wheelchairs for Kids group at Wangara. It was a very enlightening visit. The group is run totally by volunteers and they produce up to 30 wheelchairs per week. They run totally by donations. The group was formed by the Scarborough Rotary Club and since August 1998 have shipped 44,175 wheelchairs to numerous countries throughout the world. Each wheelchair is shipped with a blanket, knitted teddy bear, soft toy and a tennis ball. Each wheelchair is adjustable so is suited for the child until they are about 16 years.



I want to take this opportunity to thank the Liddelow members that help fill the bucket, in the Pottery, area with can pull tops. These are converted into aluminium tubing used in the construction of the wheelchairs. A special thanks to Pat Harris and Vaya Crean for the blankets that they crocheted. On my visit I took a bag with 12 blankets and teddies, many of these blankets were donated by these two ladies, particularly Pat. Thanks again everyone.
